

MUSIC TEACHING FELLOWSHIP, WESTMINSTER COLLEGE. Westminster College invites applications for the Diversity Teaching Fellows Program to begin August 1, 2024. The Diversity Teaching Fellows Program serves as a professional development opportunity, with structured mentoring, for scholars from historically minoritized groups who are interested in careers in higher education. This position is a full-time, non-tenure-track position in Music. This 9-month position is renewable for up to three years.

The successful candidate will teach undergraduate courses in music education, direct the jazz ensemble, teach jazz improvisation applied lessons, teach jazz history, instruct brass masterclass, and teach curriculum within the College's First-Year Program. The candidate will also recruit students for the School of Music and the College, and engage with local and regional communities. Additional teaching may be assigned based on the candidate's strengths and School of Music needs.

A Master's degree in music is required and a Doctorate in music is preferred. A minimum of three years of successful, full-time teaching experience at the K-12 level is preferred, evidence of potential for significant scholarly and/or creative work. Experience with elementary general music in public schools and trumpet or trombone performing artist is preferred. Initial screening of applications will begin on November 19, 2023.
